Kari Barber currently works at DreamWorks Animation as an Editing and Motions Graphic Designer. She is a Castilleja Alumna, Class of 2002, and went on to receive her Masters in Fine Arts from the University of Southern California. Her thesis film, *The Fifth* Horseman, has been shown at film festivals around the world and will be Oscar-qualified in September 2013.

SEMA BASOL Global Women's Leadership Network

Sema Basol is the Co-Founder of the Turkish Women's Initiative. She graduated from the Women Leaders for the World (WLW) program in 2007 and has been working on empowering young women leaders in Turkey. Through the Sparks Leadership Development program for university students, women build skills through community-based social change projects. During the 2011-12 school year, these projects have collectively impacted the lives of 18,000 individuals in Turkey.

KAREN BEHNKE Founder, Juice Beauty

Karen Behnke is the founder of Juice Beauty. a company that provides all natural, "Clinically Validated yet Authentically Organic" skin and hair products. Juice Beauty is continuously acknowledged in the media with "best of" awards and was just recently awarded its first patent for the unique Green Apple Peel formulation. Behnke has enjoyed a long and successful entrepreneurial career in health and wellness by marrying her passion for helping people enjoy healthier lifestyles with her skill at building mission-driven businesses. She started one of the first Corporate Wellness Companies in the country and then merged it into the multi-billion United Healthcare/PacifiCare Corporation during the 80's and 90's. She then served on the Board of Directors at 24 Hour Fitness during their cyber growth period in the late 90's and early 2000's. She has been recognized as Women Entrepreneur of the Year by Women's Initiative (2011), "Top EcoLeader" by Glamour Magazine, San Francisco Woman Entrepreneur of the Year (1987), San Francisco Examiner's top 39 Movers and Shakers Under the Age of 39, and Western Michigan University's Distinguished Alumni Award.

DR. SHARMILA BHATTACHARYA NASA Ames Research Center

Dr. Sharmila Bhattacharya is a senior scientist and the Director of the Biomodel Performance Laboratory in the Space Biosciences Division at NASA Ames Research Center in California. Dr.

Bhattacharya has served as the Principal Investigator for the shuttle flight experiment (Fly Immunity and Tumors, or FIT) that utilized fruit flies to understand the effects of space flight on the immune system. Dr. Bhattacharya earned her Master's and PhD degrees in Molecular Biology at Princeton University, followed by post-doctoral research in Neurobiology at Stanford University. After Bhattacharya moved to NASA Ames Research Center, she served as the Lead Scientist for the Insect Habitat, a collaborative effort by NASA and the Canadian Space Agency and developed a habitat for the International Space Station. Dr. Bhattacharva served as the Acting Project Manager for Small Biological Payloads flying on Progress, Soyuz and shuttle missions. Later Dr. Bhattacharva served as Chief Scientist for Astrobionics and the Small Spacecraft Division, helping integrate science payloads on a variety of space flight platforms. Her own research at NASA has involved studying immune changes during spaceflight, and the effects of radiation and altered gravity on the neurobehavioral system. Dr. Bhattacharva's research utilizes cell culture models and whole animal models, including Drosophila melanogater, to study oxidative stress mechanisms as it relates to space flight related conditions.

SUE BOSTROM Former Executive Vice President, Cisco Systems

Sue Bostrom is former EVP and chief marketing officer at Cisco Systems. With almost 14 years of experience at Cisco Systems in a variety of roles and more than 20 years of strategic marketing experience. she was responsible for developing and communicating Cisco's vision and strategy through positioning, branding, advertising, and product marketing. She also had responsibility for the Worldwide Government Affairs organization and leadership roles on Cisco's Consumer and Small Business Councils. Ms. Bostrom also served as the executive sponsor of the Women's Initiative at Cisco from 2001 through 2004. Ms. Bostrom joined Cisco in 1997 as vice president of applications and services marketing and was appointed to vice president of IBSG in 1998. She was promoted to senior vice president in February 2000, chief marketing officer in January 2006, and EVP in August 2007.

Previously, Ms. Bostrom served as senior vice president of global marketing and strategic planning at FTP Software. Prior to joining FTP, Ms. Bostrom worked in strategic marketing at National Semiconductor and served for seven years at McKinsey & Company as a leader in the electronics practice. She serves on the board of directors for Varian Medical Systems. Stanford Hospital and Clinics, and Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. She also serves on the advisory board of the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research. Ms. Bostrom holds an MBA from the Stanford Graduate School of Business and a BS in marketing from the University of Illinois, where she graduated in the top 1% of her class.

DR. YVONNE CAGLE NASA Astronaut & Family Physician

Dr. Yvonne Cagle is a NASA Astronaut and Family Physician. In 2008, Dr. Cagle retired as a Colonel in the USAF where she served as a Senior Flight Surgeon prior to her selection to the NASA Astronaut Corp in 1996. In 2005, Dr. Cagle was assigned to the NASA/ARC as the lead ARC Astronaut Science Liaison and Strategic Relationships Manager for Google and other Silicon Valley Programmatic Partnerships. Dr. Cagle's groundbreaking work is preserving historic NASA space legacy data while. simultaneously, galvanizing NASA's lead in global mapping, sustainable energies, green initiatives, and disaster preparedness. Dr. Cagle is advisor for the Commercial Reusable Suborbital Research Program (CRuSR). Currently Dr. Cagle is on faculty and serves as the NASA liaison for exploration and space exponential technologies with Singularity University.

MICHELLE CALE Board Member, Women's Foundation of California

Michelle Cale has been involved in multiple aspects of philanthropy surrounding education, criminal justice reform, and the empowerment and security of women and girls. Saima Hasan founded the Roshni Academy as a junior at Stanford in 2007, with the goal to empower brilliant girls from impoverished areas to help them realize their full potential.

Funded by Silicon Valley business leaders and philanthropists, the program identifies, trains, and mentors girls through the course of an intensive six-month training period. The program to date has served thousands of girls. Hasan has traveled all over India expanding the reach of Roshni. She received her Bachelor of Science from Stanford University in 2008.
